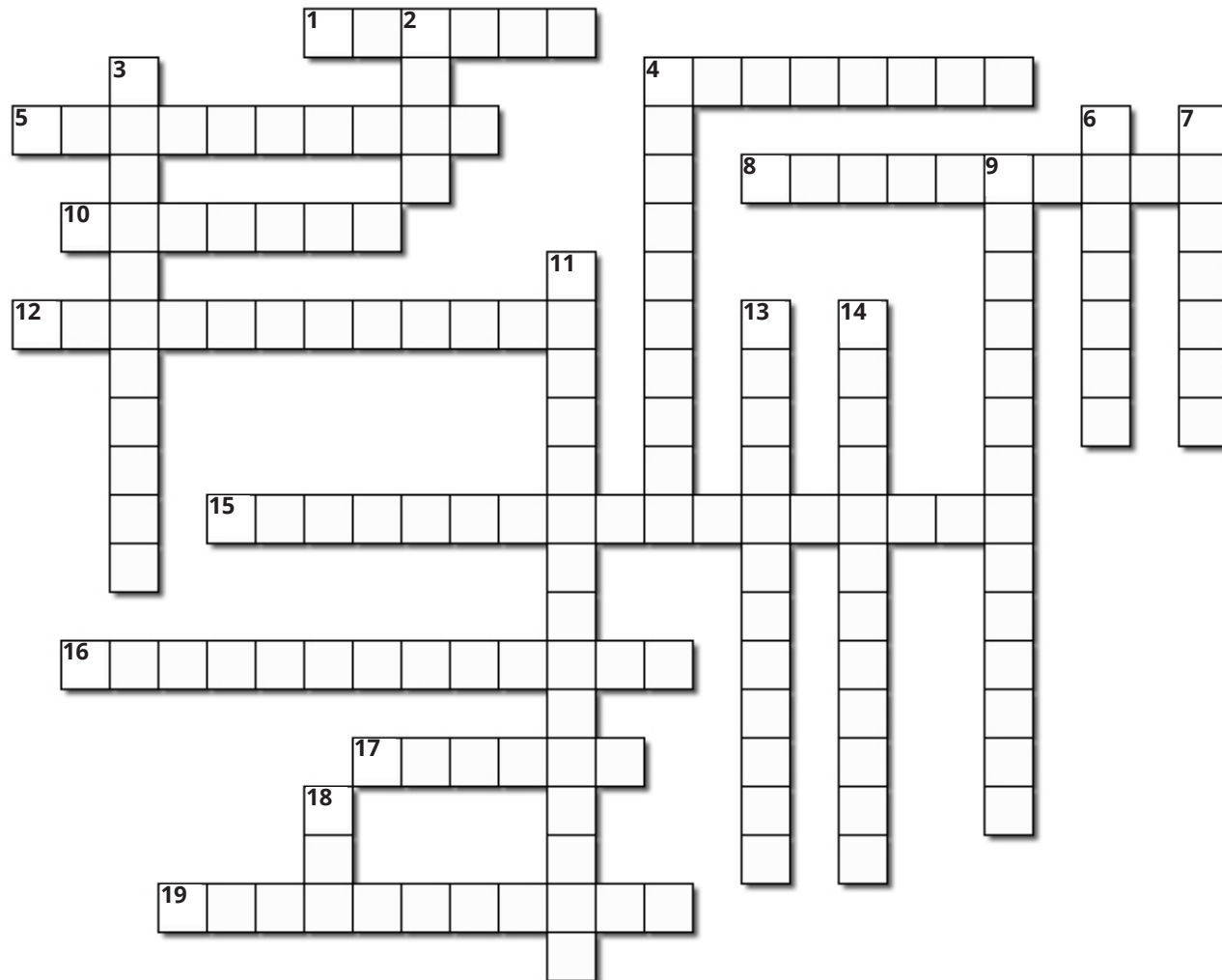
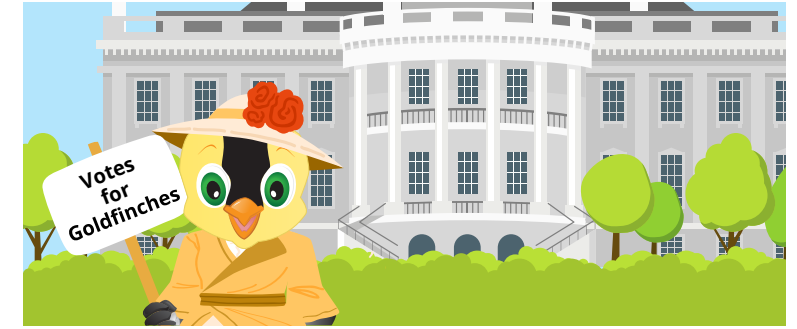


## Women's Suffrage

1. A person or group of people standing outside a building to protest.
4. The right to vote in political elections.
5. Constitutional amendment, ratified in 1920, that guaranteed women the right to vote.
8. Mary Jane \_\_\_\_: Longtime activist known as the "mother of women's suffrage in Iowa."
10. A statement or action expressing disapproval of or objection to something.
12. A method of nonviolent protest to refuse solid food in support of a political cause. This resistance was used by some suffragists who were imprisoned, like Alice Paul. (two words)
15. Seeds of the women's suffrage movement had already taken root in the state by 1870 when this association was founded in support of this cause. (three words)
16. President of the United States when women got the right to vote. (two words)
17. Helena \_\_\_\_: Woman who served as president of the Iowa branch of the National Association of Colored Women's Club (NACWC).
19. First women's rights convention that took place in the U.S.

2. Carrie Lane Chapman \_\_\_\_: Raised most her life in Charles City, Iowa, this woman would serve as president of the National American Woman Suffrage Association from 1900-1904 and 1915-1920.
3. To give the rights of citizenship to a person or group of people, especially to give that group the right to vote.
4. Declaration of \_\_\_\_: A document written by Elizabeth Cady Stanton in 1848 that set the agenda for decades of women's activism.
6. The kind of suffrage Iowa women were granted in 1894.
7. Amelia Jenks \_\_\_\_: This person founded the Iowa Woman Suffrage Association and was elected president in 1871 at the first annual convention in Des Moines.
9. Women's-rights activist who asked "Ain't I a woman?" in a famous 1851 speech. (two words)
11. In April 1919, this Iowa legislative body passed a bill granting women the right to vote in presidential elections. (two words)
13. To approve and make valid.
14. This woman became the first African-American woman to be admitted to the Iowa Bar and was active in the Colored Women's Suffrage Club.
18. \_\_\_\_ M. Wilson Brown: An accomplished political activist, writer, suffragist and editor who dedicated her time to leading African-American women's clubs, civil rights and women's suffrage.
